

Who Needs Treatment ?

Those who suffer from physical or psychological dependence on opiates require treatment for the addiction in order to recover and to remain abstinent. When an addiction or abuse is caught early on, there may not be a need for medications such as Buprenorphine to help ward off withdrawal. As the addiction progresses and becomes worse, the need for such medications increases and may reach a critical state.

- You have tried to quit using opioids on your own and have failed.
- You have a desire to quit using opioids but cannot seem to do so.

• You take opioids despite the known dangers or health complications that they're causing you.

- You take more drugs than you intended to.
- You use drugs instead of spending time with family, loved ones for other people who matter to you.
- Your drug use has interfered with your daily routine.

• You use drugs despite the problems that the abuse has caused financially, emotionally, spiritually, or otherwise.

These are some of the potential signs of opiate addiction. Treatment can help you get your life back on track by providing you with support, counseling, and care that you may not be aware is available to you

The Indy Transitions Addiction Treatment Program is based on the Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) model in which medical therapy and counseling play an equally important role. Our program is led by a Board Certified Addiction Medicine Physician Specialist along with providers who meet the rigorous SAMHSA criteria for treatment of Addiction. We have inhouse mental health and behavioral support staff including PhD's, LCSW's, LCAC's and psychiatric nurse practitioners. Participation in mental health counseling is an integral and mandatory part of our services.

Supported by specially trained RN managers who provide intense case management services, each client has a personal, dynamic treatment plan created. All patients are expected to reduce and then eliminate their dependence.

Our motto is that we do not trade one addiction for another.

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We treat the entire spectrum of substance abuse including OPIOIDS (Fentanyl, Heroin, Prescription opioids), Benzodiazepines, Alcohol, Marijuana, and are the ONLY entity successfully treating stimulant addiction including Methamphetamine, Cocaine, Crack and K2.

We use Lucemyra, the ONLY FDA approved medication to mitigate OPIOID withdrawal

We treat the spectrum of substance abuse including opioids, alcohol Marijuana and Stimulants (Meth).
